I. Intro

- A. Last week, talked about how to read your Bible
 - 1. Summarize the story
 - 2. Summarize the larger story
 - 3. Summarize what is required of you
- B. Approach is very helpful when reading the gospels (Mt, Mk, Lk, Jn)
 - 1. Story is plain to see gospels are narrative
 - 2. Larger story can either be:
 - a) Old Testament callbacks, allusions, or echos
 - b) Deeper lessons within the story (hidden meaning, secret, or mystery)
 - 3. What is required directed to the disciples, but for us also
 - a) Jesus is speaking to the 12 disciples, but also for ALL disciples
- C. Using this modified approach, let's explore Luke 5

II. Text

A. Luke 5:1-11

- 1. What is the story?
 - a) Jesus was teaching near Galilee, saw 2 boats with no fish
 - b) Jesus gets in a boat, teaches, closes His message with a lesson on fishing
 - c) Fisherman obey Jesus and catch enough fish to sink 2 boats
 - (1) On the surface this story is about a miracle
 - (2) An increase for the fisherman a blessing to their business and family
- 2. What is the larger story (hidden meaning, secret, or mystery)?
 - a) Hidden meaning isn't fish, it is the kingdom of God
 - (1) It's about how mankind is captured by this message
 - (2) It's about the salvation found in being captured
 - (3) It's about how God makes disciples to throw the net
 - b) The mystery of this story is what Jesus is asking these men to do
- 3. What is Jesus asking these men to do, and us as well?
 - a) Realize how insufficient you are, and how badly you need Jesus

- b) Fall to your knees in reverence and awe over His greatness and your sin
- c) Leave everything behind and follow Him

B. Luke 5:12-26

- 1. What is the story?
 - a) Jesus was traveling around Galilee, healing people's bodies
 - b) Healed a leper and a paralyzed man
 - c) Religious leaders grew upset, but the people glorified God
- 2. What is the larger story (hidden meaning, secret, or mystery)?
 - a) The Leper
 - (1) Jesus told the leper to follow the cleansing law of Moses [Lev 14:2-32]
 - (2) In obeying the law, Jesus forced the priests to affirm His power and divinity
 - (3) Hidden meaning whole system is set up to testify FOR Jesus
 - b) The Paralytic
 - (1) Man needed his sins forgiven more than he needed to walk
 - (a) But, what is easier to say "sins forgiven" or "get up and walk"
 - (b) Obviously, sins are forgiven because you can't test it, or see it
 - (2) The secret the healing proves the power to forgive sins
 - (a) If you can't see if sins are forgiven, how do you know?
 - (b) You look to what you can see, a healed body points to a healed soul
- 3. What do these stories require?
 - a) The same thing the first story required
 - (1) A complete and total surrender
 - (2) An awareness that you don't have, in your power, what you need
 - (a) You are fishless, unclean, and strapped to a stretcher
 - (b) Your only move is to put your faith in Jesus and let Him change your life
 - b) This story requires a posture from you:
 - (1) A posture that says "Lord, if you don't move, work, speak, I'm done for"
 - (2) A deep dependency on Jesus in everything you do
 - (3) A real, honest-to-goodness, poverty of soul that cries out for Christ

C. Luke 5:27-39

- 1. What is the story?
 - a) Jesus calls a tax collector, Levi (Matthew), to follow Him
 - b) In Levi's joy, he leaves everything and throws a party to celebrate
 - c) Religious leaders get upset and question why the disciples don't fast
- 2. What is the larger story (hidden meaning, secret, or mystery)?
 - a) The Physician
 - (1) Jesus says, "those who are well have no need of a doctor"
 - (2) The secret nobody is well, everyone is sick
 - (3) Think you are well? You broadcast, you have no need for Jesus.
 - b) The Old and the New (fabric and wine)
 - (1) New fabric on old, and new wine in old skins doesn't match, always tears
 - (2) Old things are old and new things are new they don't mix
 - (3) The mystery (vs39) anyone who has tasted the old, doesn't like the new
 - (4) Like the old ways? You proclaim, you have no need for Jesus.
- 3. What is required?
 - a) We all need a greater understanding of our real needs
 - (1) This world has a sin problem. The church has a sin problem.
 - (2) The problem comes from thinking we are healthier than we are
 - (3) The problem comes from liking old, sinful things not new glorious things
 - b) Whatever the cause, the solution is the same

D. Conclusion

- 1. What is this solution I am speaking about?
 - a) The solution fishermen, Simon, the leper, the paralytic, and Levi found
 - b) The solution complete and total surrender to Jesus
 - (1) Not the superficial mixing of Jesus with this world
 - (2) Not the embrace of a hippie Jesus who loves everything
 - (3) Not the outward appearance of surrender with no death to your flesh
- 2. Luke 5 leave everything behind, come to Jesus, He will change your life
