I. Intro

A. Working our way through The Gospel of Luke – let's pick up the story in Luke 6

II. Text

A. Luke 6:1-11

- 1. John 21:25 Jesus did many things not recorded
 - a) Q: Why did Luke record this? Why does it follow the new wineskin [Luke 5:37]
 - b) A: Luke is painting a contrasting picture for his readers
 - (1) Old way Israel, 12 tribes, law, Pharisees interpret law for everyone
 - (2) New way retelling of the old way in new and greater terms
 - (a) Jesus is the better Israel, 12 disciples, fulfilling AND interpreting the law
- 2. Luke gives 2 sabbath stories to illustrate this point
 - a) Picking grain and healing a withered hand both on sabbath
 - b) Stories contrast the old way of bondage and new way of freedom
 - (1) Old way man is a slave to the sabbath (list of do's and don'ts)
 - (2) New way Christ is lord of the sabbath, sabbath is for man [Mk 2:27]
- 3. In fact, sabbath is a foreshadow of a deeper mystery
 - a) Sabbath illustrates salvation and eternal rest in God [Heb 4:9-11]
 - b) Jesus takes issue with Pharisees clouding the message
- 4. Main source of contention for the rest of this chapter
 - a) God things are refashioned into man things and used for bondage
 - b) Old ways, meant to point people to God, now point to man and power
 - c) Therefore, Jesus is retelling the story of Israel by walking it out
 - (1) His entire life is a recasting and retelling of the Israel story
 - (2) Israel was meant to be a light to the nations they weren't
 - (3) Jesus is placing that light in 12 disciples and sending them to nations
- 5. The rest of this chapter is a study between the old and the new

B. Luke 6:12-19

- 1. Can you see Luke making connections for his readers?
 - a) Moses on a mountain, came down to the people Same for Jesus

- b) Jacob up all night praying Jesus up all night praying
- c) Jacob had 12 sons (twelve tribes) Jesus has 12 disciples
- d) Israel was meant to be a light to gentiles Tyre and Sidon are Gentile cities
- 2. The scene is set:
 - a) The new and better Israel is ready to deliver the new and better guidelines
 - b) How does he do it? shows the contrast between the old and new ways

C. Luke 6:20-26

- 1. These new ways are revolutionary
 - a) Anyone who follows Jesus is blessed!
 - (1) Blessed if you are poor in spirit having nothing else but Him
 - (2) Blessed if you are hungry desiring nothing else but Him
 - (3) Blessed if people hate you for it your disdain for this world upsets others
 - b) Rejoice when you treasure Christ and it costs you something
 - (1) It cost the prophets before you
 - (2) But, they received their reward in heaven
- 2. Speaking of rewards, let's contrast the new way with the old way
 - a) Woe to those who get all they can get now you will have nothing later
 - b) Woe to those who satisfy all their desires now you will be hungry forever
 - c) Woe to those who pursue pleasure and laughter now you will weep
 - d) Woe to those who desperately want everyone to like them God won't
- 3. Do you see the contrast between the old and the new?
 - a) It has spread beyond the old Israel (Pharisees) and new Israel (Jesus)
 - b) It now speaks in terms of the whole world
 - (1) Old nature vs New Nature Nonbelievers and Christians
 - (2) The old is all the old ways of this world The new is what Christ offers
 - (3) The old looks appealing now, but ends in suffering and woe
 - (4) The new looks unappealing to the flesh, but the destination is eternal joy

D. Luke 6:27-36

1. Jesus continues contrasting 2 ways – "Want to be part of this new thing?"

- a) New: Love your enemies. Don't retaliate. Give freely, hold nothing back
- b) Old: love those who are easy to love, seek revenge, invest for ROI only
- c) The main point these two ways aren't compatible, they are opposites
- 2. You can't follow Jesus and let the world define love
 - a) The world, your old nature looks out for itself, that is what is normal
 - b) In Christ, that can't be normal anymore generosity is now normal
 - (1) Think about what you want someone to do for you do that
 - (2) Think of people you don't like go out of your way to show kindness
 - (3) Stop holding grudges and acting only when it benefits you
- 3. These are hallmarks of the new way Jesus continues

E. Luke 6:37-49

- 1. Even our sense of judgment is different in this new way
 - a) Jesus isn't saying "Don't use wisdom" or "Call evil good, and good evil"
 - b) Jesus is addressing the old way of clouding his message
 - c) Pharisees judged who was "worthy" of hearing the message
 - (1) Created a barrier to who could approach God
 - (2) Can't do that in the new way you don't judge who is worthy of hearing
- 2. But here is the worst part
 - a) Old way judged who was worthy AND taught others to live this way Pharisees
 - b) This is what Jesus is addressing in the final verses of Luke 6
- III. Conclusion
 - A. Old way produced bad fruit AND bad teachers to keep it going
 - 1. So, not enough to consider your old actions in this new way
 - 2. You must also consider your old teachers in this new way
 - B. To truly move forward in Christ you must accept Him as a new teacher
 - 1. It is His way. His terms. His timing.
 - 2. It means forsaking all things, all worldly desires...and all worldly teachers
 - C. The question Luke wants us to consider:
 - 1. Who is teaching me? Instructing me? What voice is the primary voice in my life?
