- I. Intro
 - A. Ended last week with a discussion on death
 - 1. Following Jesus looks like death to self
 - 2. Theme continues for the rest of Luke 9
 - B. We pick up in Luke 9:28
 - 1. Pay attention to how Luke tells the story of following Jesus
 - 2. A historical account of what happened
 - 3. Also, a relevant way of understanding our Christian walk
- II. Text

A. Luke 9:28-36

- 1. About ($\dot{\omega}\sigma\varepsilon i$) 8 days after the teaching on death (Mt & Mk say 6 days)...
 - a) Jesus prays on a mountain with Peter, James, and John
 - b) Christ is transfigured, Moses and Elijah appear
 - c) 3 are asleep, 3 talk about the second exodus
- 2. Literal mountain top experience law, prophets, and king converge
 - a) Significant moment for entire Bible story
 - b) Peter wants to build tabernacles symbol of memorial and worship [Lev 23:34]
 - c) Peter wants to ascribe equal value/worship to all three
- 3. Why is this an issue?
 - a) The Bible points to Jesus, not Moses or Elijah or some event
 - b) Events, stories, and people are arrows --> pointing to something better
 - c) The better has arrived don't elevate traditions as equal or above Jesus
- 4. This is why, in response to Peter, the Father speaks
 - a) This is my son, MY CHOSEN, listen to Him
 - b) No person, no experience, no tradition greater than Jesus
 - (1) Conflict between feelings and Jesus? listen to Jesus!
 - (2) Conflict between traditions and Jesus? listen to Jesus!

B. Luke 9:37-43a

1. Story occurs in all three synoptic gospels (Mt, Mk, Lk)

- a) Always follows the Transfiguration
- b) Always includes father with demonized child and inadequate disciples
- c) Always includes Jesus' frustration due to a lack of faith
 - (1) In Mark, the father has faith issues
 - (2) In Matthew, the disciples have faith issues
- 2. So, which is it? It is both
 - a) Father lacks faith because he struggles to believe God
 - (1) Does God even care? Who am I to ask for such a thing? Will it even work?
 - b) Disciples lack faith because they rely on routines instead of God
 - (1) Were sent out and had success just last week
 - (2) They tried to do what worked last time, not trust God
 - c) The whole situation lacked faith
 - (1) Jesus was frustrated went from glory on the mountain to unbelief
 - (2) Parallel to Moses and the golden calf
- 3. But, I want to draw your attention to vs 43
 - a) They were astonished at the majesty ($\mu\epsilon\gamma\alpha\lambda\epsilon\iota\dot{\sigma}\eta\varsigma$) of God
 - b) Same word Peter used when describing the transfiguration [2 Peter 1:16-18]
 - (1) The majesty on the mountain is the majesty in the valley
 - (2) The same greatness, magnificence, and glory present in the special, holy moments is present in your day-to-day life
 - c) You don't have to "go somewhere holy" or special to meet the Lord
 - (1) You can meet him tomorrow morning on the way to work
 - (2) And this reality should leave us marveled

C. Luke 9:43-50

- 1. As the disciples marveled at the majesty of Jesus, it was reality-check time
 - a) "Let these words sink in" Jesus is going to die
 - b) Couldn't understand because it was concealed or hidden
 - c) But, they didn't ask because they were afraid
- 2. And now we get to Luke's thrust of this chapter death

- a) What is happening?
 - (1) Jesus has started the journey to Jerusalem
 - (2) Whole journey is marked with death
 - (3) Death at the end (crucifixion) and death on the road (surrender)
- b) When we follow Jesus, we walk this same journey of death
 - (1) Put to death your unbelief and fear of asking questions
 - (2) Surrender your desire to be popular and get ahead at other's expense
 - (3) Die to pointing out other's failures to make you look better
 - (4) Crucify your sense of competition and restricting other's access
 - (5) Bury your sense of greatness and majesty, because His is better
- 3. This last story really drives home the point...

III. Conclusion

A. Luke 9:51-62

- 1. Jesus sets his face toward Jerusalem
 - a) Meaning, there is only one thing that matters now the coming exodus
 - b) Status, acceptance, competition, possessions nothing matters
 - c) Christ has fixed His eyes on the road to death
- 2. Why does Luke want us to see this?
 - a) So we will fix our eyes on the same thing
 - (1) No more revenge
 - (2) No more worrying about homes or where to lay your head
 - (3) No more trying to make people happy or keeping up appearances
 - (4) No more sense of loyalty to corrupt earthly systems
 - (5) And most of all, no more looking back
- 3. The picture Luke paints is clear
 - a) The road to Jerusalem is marked by surrender and death to self
 - b) It is a narrow road, that many choose to ignore
 - c) But, it is the road of our King and it is the road we must walk
 - d) It is a road of death, but you will find His majesty when you walk it
